HISTORY AND OVERVIEW:

The District of Columbia Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE) is excited to bring College Conversations back in 2021! Traditionally, this has been an invite-only recruitment event that brings together high-achieving high school seniors from District of Columbia public and charter schools and selective colleges and universities in an effort to address the issue of student "undermatching" at the postsecondary level. College Conversations allows students and admissions counselors to meet each other in a more personal setting than a traditional college fair through panel discussions and small group conversations.

This year, in partnership with the George Washington University (GW), we are going virtual and maximizing the benefits of that format to also include underclassmen, over a full week of activities with college representatives and scholarship organizations, **Sept. 13-17, 2021**. Students have the opportunity to attend topical panels on which representatives from college and financial aid entities will discuss the theme for that panel. Seniors will also be able to engage in small college conversations with representatives through breakout rooms following each panel. On Wednesday, all participants may attend panel discussions on financial aid, and parents and families are encouraged to join in! There will be a culminating college fair opportunity for all participating institutions, including a Scholarship Showcase, on Friday, Sept. 17, just for seniors.

PLATFORM:

We will use the Whova virtual event platform, which will host all events throughout the week for student attendees. After invited students register to attend, they will receive detailed instructions on how to create a participant profile in Whova so that colleges will know who they are talking to throughout the event. Students will be able to interact with fellow participants and compete in a Passport Contest by visiting virtual college booths and participating in panel discussions.

WHOM WE INVITE - REPS & ORGS:

Our goal is to introduce qualified students to a range of academically rigorous institutions and the exceptional opportunities offered by the schools invited to this event. A list of criteria used to identify participating institutions is included on <u>our website</u>. This year, we are also inviting a select number of local and national scholarship and financial aid organizations to participate in a special "Scholarship Showcase" within the college fair on Friday. A preview of registered organizations is provided on the last page of this document.

WHOM WE INVITE - STUDENTS:

Invited students include: top 5 seniors from every high school in the District of Columbia, and 10th-11th grade students ranking in the top 3 percent of their high school class; students participating in dual enrollment and early college opportunities with a 3.5 cumulative GPA; and students participating in OSSE Scholars, a unique program that sends District students to rigorous college summer programs throughout the nation.

EVENT STRUCTURE

PANELS:

Each evening, Monday through Friday, two panel discussions are offered – one aimed at high school seniors and one aimed at sophomores and juniors. Panels include four to six college representatives and registered students will be able to access panel discussions only through the Whova event platform.

8 p.m. **College Financial Aid Panel** (all grade levels and families)

NOTE: There will be no College Conversations following panels on Wednesday evening.

Thursday 7 p.m. **Benefits of Attending an HBCU** (12th grade)

Understanding "Match and Fit" (10th and 11th grades)

Friday 7 p.m. Finalizing your College Application List (12th grade)

8 p.m. Creating an Activity Resume (10th and 11th grades)

NOTE: There will be no College Conversations following panels on Friday evening.

Each panel is moderated by either OSSE or GW staff. Each panelist will provide a brief overview of their institution and then respond to questions on the panel topic, presented by the moderator. Ample time is built in for audience Q&A - and participants receive "stamps" for the Passport Contest by engaging and asking questions!







COLLEGE CONVERSATIONS

On Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings following the panels, seniors have the opportunity to visit each of the panelists in a 30-minute breakout session for "college conversations" - where students who have interest in a particular institution can go to ask specific questions. Seniors are free to move from room to room during this time and, similar to panels, will earn "stamps" for the Passport Contest by visiting the most booths and engaging with the reps!

COLLEGE FAIR:

On Friday, Sept. 17, from 5-6:30 p.m. EST, all registered college, scholarship, and financial aid organizations, regardless of participation in panels throughout the week, will participate in our virtual college fair and scholarship showcase. Rising seniors can visit virtual booths, as they would in a physical college fair, to ask specific questions about each institution or organization, and can move freely from booth to booth during the 90-minutes, earning more stamps for the Passport Contest along the way!

Select local and national scholarship organizations will also participate the college fair in a section called the "Scholarship Showcase," and many colleges offering institutional scholarships and programs will be featured as well. Seniors are encouraged to peruse the information provided in each booth at their leisure.

All booth information will be available for participants for three months following the event.
